CLASSES AND WORKSHOPS



BAIT HIVE FUN DAVID

PETERSON

I've been keeping bees for 18+ years, always at my house in Ross and for a number of years by the parking lot of a building in Corte Madera near the High Canal. I have kept 10 or more colonies at both my house and Corte Madera apiaries. Yet in all this time, I have never put out a Bait Hive. The fact is I have always enjoyed capturing swarms the old fashion by shaking them into a hive box. My favorite way to get new bees is by extraction, using the Cone Method to coach a colony into a catch hive and have them raise their new Queen.

Bonnie and Gary have always talked a lot about Bait Hives and the success they have had. This year, with so many of our members successfully catching swarms using Bait Hives, I decided to give it a try.

After research, I put out three Bait Hives around my property some distance away from the apiary. I used single deep boxes with six frames of old comb, two empty frames, each with a 1 inch strip of wax



foundation at the top.

This leaves an empty space where the three more frames would fit. There is a thought that the swarm scouts might prefer a cavity with some amount of open space. As an added incentive to attract a swarm I placed a cotton ball with several drops of Lemongrass Oil at the back of the box.

Almost immediately after setting them up, there were several bees checking them out. After only about a week, I had a move in. I didn't get to witness the arrival, but noticed a lot of activity at the entrance. When I opened the inner cover, I was delighted to find a large colony with 7 or 8 frames of bees. They had already begun to draw fresh comb, adding to the strips in the open frames.

They had also started to draw comb down from the inner cover in the open space. I removed that comb and filled the open



space with two more frames of old comb in the open space I had left. I took a picture of one of these frames 10 days after arrival. This frame was nearly filled out to the edges and partially attached and full of perfectly capped brood.

You should give it a try. It's the easiest way to get new bees.

REMEMBERING DAN STRALK

We lost a dearly beloved member of the Marin bee club, Dan Stralka. He passed away guite suddenly in November. It would be strange to put out the newsletter without a tribute to him. since he was a huge part of the club. He mentored many folks and was one of the first memebers in the Survivor Stock Program. He made mead and wine was was happy to share his latest batch. He made candles, and taught others how to do it so he could have a good competition at the Fair. He'd just retired from his job at the EPA. I have a memory of Dan showing up a swarm call that I'd taken. It was on a busy street and the swarm had landed on a car, so there were gawkers and lots of excitement. Dan came and helped me out, kept people calm and even loaned me an extra swarm box for the big job. It was just in his nature to be part of the community with his aenerosity.

"It was Dan who was always first to lend a hand or teach a newbee like me how to catch a swarm and use a bee vac 12 years ago. He answered swarm calls that he knew would not end with a box of bees for himself but because he knew the bees had to be rescued or that a person needed help." Cynthia Perry
